



Pupil Premium Statement – September, 2016

What is Pupil Premium?

The pupil premium is funding allocated to schools for the specific purpose of boosting the attainment of pupils from low-income families. Funding is based on children who have registered for a free school meal at any point in the last six years and children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces.

Why has it been introduced?

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children in eligible groups and their peers and by ensuring that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most.

How can it be spent?

As a school we can decide how to spend the Pupil Premium for the benefit of our children. However, we will be held to account on how we have used this funding and the impact that it has had. Guidance has been given by the Government on strategies which could be used to improve pupil's progress and attainment.

How much funding did the school receive last year?

Last year we received £130,775. 25% of the children were eligible for the Pupil Premium funding.

How was the Pupil Premium spent?

1:1 and small group intervention work led by teaching assistants to close the learning gap	e.g. RWI 1:1 phonics, Lexia support, Better Reading programme, morning 1:1 readers, 1st Class@Number 1 and 2, Numbers Count 2, Talk 4 Number, Success@Arithmetic etc
Teacher led intervention work to address underachievement and slow progress	Maths booster classes in Y6
An additional teacher in both Y2 and Y6 to target all ability groups including gifted children	Reading, writing and maths provision
Purchase of computer software	Lexia Core 5, Testbase
Nurture group support led by HLTAs	Social and emotional needs of target children addressed to boost confidence and self-esteem
Transport costs of educational visits	Cost of class visits were subsidised to ensure all children took part in enrichment activities

Who can I speak to about the Pupil Premium funding?

Mr Foreman, the Headteacher, and Mrs Windows, the SENDCo, are the strategic leaders responsible for Pupil Premium funding.

Pupil premium is additional money given to schools for each child who qualifies for free school meals. It's one of the reasons that we want everyone who is entitled to free school meals to apply. The money allocated to schools is to be spent in making sure those children from eligible families make good progress and are able to have the same chances as their peers.
